<sup>\*</sup> Note: this chord can be moved anywhere on the fretboard. The note on the 5th string is the "root note" which will determine which chord you're playing. For example, if you start on this chord on 5th string, 3rd fret (C) you'll be playing a C7 (pronounced, "C seven" or "C dominant").
